With the departure of Sean Salter, and with him the CoB's real estate program, the finance unit's final chapter appears be in press. What has transpired along the southern corridors of Greene Hall over the past 2 years goes to show, once again, that what takes years to build can be brought down virtually over night. The CoB's finance group was once a proud bastion of scholarship and teaching rigor. Its recent alumni now span the country, from Texas Tech in the west to the North Carolina -- Wilmington in the east. However, in a thumb war pitting construction versus destruction, Lindley, or anyone for that matter, is no match for the destruction skills of individuals like former CoB Dean Harold Doty and EFIB Chair George Carter.
