## The Rule of 72

With Donna Davis' retirement from the CoB's decision sciences group, the organization (the CoB) has now lost 72 faculty since the Harold Doty administration commenced in 2003. Some are speculating that the CoB's economists are already planning and executing activities that will hasten Nail's demise, all as a result of his decision to eliminate their major and their nine faculty lines. Nail failed to rid himself of all nine – leaving behind the four mostly junior economists to work in USM's CoAL. Surely considering the personalities involved (e.g., Sami Dakhlia), Nail's reputation around campus will continue to be muddied. Sources are already telling USMNEWS.net that his reputation has been sinking like a stone as a result of recent campus politics.

As a recent USMNEWS.net editorial explained, losing Davis will come as a serious blow to the talent-starved Nail administration. The Davis episode shows us all that the faculty flow that has continued unabated since 2003 is still capable of causing serious damage to the college and to USM.
