## Why Such a Difficult Time?

We've heard it so many times that you might even believe it. Well, don't. The record shows there's nothing "difficult" about it -- using State E&G dollars to boost faculty salaries, that is.

One only has to go as far back as the 2007 merit raise process to see how easy it is. For example, the combined \$17,500 (approx) raise reserved for econnewbies Sami Dakhlia and Akbar Marvasti shows how simple the formula is. Report after report at usmnews.net shows just how unwarranted the thing is. Then there's the \$9,300 raise that went to the new Draughn *Assistant* Professor Michael Wittmann, which, when compared to the paltry sum given to Talai Osmonbekov, makes the whole E&G thing look easy as pie.
