## Another Secret Presidential Search Another Recipe for Disaster

JSU has a new President. On Wednesday, May 31, 2017, the IHL once again crammed someone down the throats of faculty, students and alumni after yet another secret presidential search. Stated in IHL-eze, JSU was told the "preferred" candidate was William Bynum, currently President of MVSU was to be their presidenent. He came to campus to smile and be vague while talking about an unspecified "vision" for the future.
