Bend it Like Latin A FRESH LOOK AT THE STALE USM SOCCER PROGRAM *by* Victoria Tyler

Much has been <u>reported</u> about USM's use of roughly \$7 million in student and taxpayer <u>money</u> to <u>support</u> the institution's \$19 million athletics department. Some of the <u>discussion</u> thus far has centered on the dismal state of USM's soccer program, which is led by Scott Ebke. After taking charge of the program before the 2008 season, Ebke became the first new coach of the Martha Saunders administration of USM.

The table below contains data on how Ekbe's USM soccer program has performed since 2008 against the rest of Conference USA, the benchmark for coaches at USM. As the table makes clear, the program is not doing well.

Against conference foes, the USM Lady Eagles soccer program is a dismal 1-22-0 (wins-losses-ties) since Ekbe took the reins. That includes 0-3-0 marks against East Carolina, Marshall, and Memphis. Other teams, which Ekbe stands 0-2-0 against at the moment, are almost certain to join this group of three in the coming days and weeks. At 1-22-0, Ekbe has won only 4.3% of his Conference USA matches. As Susan Green-Lewis has pointed out, there is little wonder why USM students do not support this program through their attendance. Through the 47 USM soccer competitions that Ebke has headed to date, he has managed only 12 wins, and six of those have come against Mississippi Valley State, Jackson State, and Northwestern State Louisiana. Overall, Ebke stands at 12-33-2 (27.7% success), and will likely fall to 12-41-2 (23.6% success) by the end of the 2010 season, his third in Hattiesburg. By then, his Conference USA record will likely be 1-29-0 (3.3% success). For a look at Ebke's overall performance from 2008 to the present, see Table 2 below.
