Why Is There So Little Trust In Leaders?

We organize the history by documenting representations made by President Saunders and Provost Lyman in their report to a Faculty Senate meeting on <u>December 5, 2008</u> (page 2, para. 7). In an equally absurd argument presented to the faculty senators, "President Saunders stressed the extensive amount of travel (over \$8 million last year alone) among the faculty, administration and other offices including athletics and development." Why include this bit of information? Is Saunders proposing her airplane will save the \$8 million in travel costs? Of course not. But why make such a statement if it is not meant to divert attention from the facts that should be considered when purchasing N777AQ? Irrelevant information overload serves the purpose of distracting the audience and confusing the relevant issues.

The faculty senators were entirely too polite to let this nonsense pass for relevant information.
