A Look at the 2006 Merit Raises

This issue visits the 2006 merit raises for the first time in this series. A snapshot of the Top 10 merit raises list is provided below (taken from a separate report at USMPRIDE.COM):

Two of the Top 10 raise recipients are Charles Sawyer (#7) and Franklin Mixon (#9). Sawyer is believed by many to be an ardent supporter of the CoB's administrative team, while Mixon is often associated with the so-called "CoB Mob." While the difference in the two rankings (2 places) seems small, Sawyer's 2006 merit raise was more than 13percent larger than Mixon's.

A recent search of EBSCO*host* revealed some interesting details regarding the two economists who are the focus of this issue. The table below shows the number of A-level publications (*Enhancing Faculty Productivity*, revised) that were found for each using an EBSCO*host* search for the 2003-05 period – the period covered (for research) during the 2006 merit raise process:

As Table 1 indicates, Sawyer failed to produce an A-level journal publication over the 2003-05 period, while Mixon produced seven (7). This is not even close, yet the record indicates that Sawyer got 13.3% more money in 2006 than did Mixon.

Once again, a member of the so-called CoB Mob got hosed. This time the administration culprit was EFIB Chair George Carter.
