She will be teaching ACC 320 (Ele Cost Accounting) from 2:00pm until 3:15pm on Mondays and Wednesdays, and ACC 610 (Advanced Auditing) from 10:00am until 11:50am, also on Mondays and Wednesdays. Parker has published in the Allied Academies' *Academy of Accounting & Financial Studies Journal*. With this on her c.v., Parker's entry into the CoB reminds one of the old *31st & Pearl* column entitled <u>Schlockburg, MS 40907</u>.

The SAIS is also adding Barry Cumbie to its ranks. Cumbie joins the MIS unit as a new PhD from Auburn University. Cumbie brings a publication in *AMCIS Proceedings* with him to USM's College of Business, where he will be teaching two sections of MIS 300 (Mgmt Info Sys) on Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 1:00pm until 2:15pm and from 2:25pm until 3:40pm. Cumbie's fall 2008 teaching load highlights a trend USMNEWS.net reporters have observed of late, and that is an "afternoon heavy" fall 2008 teaching menu from USM's business school. Textbook Scandals Old-Hat in USM's CoB

Members of the larger USM community and other readers of USMNEWS.net might be interested to know that textbook scandals, like those recent scandals reported on in <u>Textbook Bad Press</u> and

editorialized by Joe Hall in <u>Do You See What I See?</u>, are not new to USM's business school. Months ago USMNEWS.net covered some of these in the <u>Babin Textbook Factory</u> and in a separate report on other <u>textbook shenanigans</u>. The first report discusses former CoB marketing professor, Laurie Babin's, textbook ancillary activities while in the CoB, activities that are shown to have seriously hindered Babin's academic research portfolio. The second report linked here discusses former CoB economist Charles Sawyer's textbook authorship, which went into full effect after the CoB added ECO 336 (international economics) to the core curriculum. As a result of that addition, the CoB would not only employ more economists, like Sawyer, it would also guarantee Sawyer, and his publisher, the sale of several hundred units at USM alone. Many of these types of issues and controversies have been hot topics on the <u>USM Forum - To build trust</u>, a team and a <u>campus - Message Board</u> in recent days.
