Google Scholar Revisits Management & Tourism Management

It has been a few months since we examined Google Scholar cites in the CoB's management unit. We revisit the management professors' Google Scholar citations in Table 1 below.

As Table 1 indicates, Harold Doty leads the GS cites race in management, followed by Sharon Topping and Joseph Peyrefitte. Thirty percent of the CoB's management faculty do not have any cited work, while 40% of the group have failed to garner more than nine GS cites.

It has also been a few months since we examined Google Scholar cites in the CoB's tourism management unit. We revisit the tourism management professors' Google Scholar citations in Table 2 below.

As Table 2 indicates, Cheri Becker leads the GS cites race in management, followed by Catherine Price and Babu George. Forty percent of the CoB's tourism management faculty do not have any cited work.

Wittmann to Get His 2/2 Teaching Load

After building what appears to be [A Bird's Nest on the Ground](#) via the CoB's new journal ratings, Michael Wittmann, the CoB's *Max Draughn Distinguished Associate Professor of Healthcare Marketing*, looks to be getting the [healthcare marketing](#) center that USMNEWS.net [reporters wrote about](#) a few weeks ago. According to the 17-18 September 2008 IHL Board Minutes, the relevant portion of which is shown below, Mississippi's central higher education authority approved the CoB's request for a "new limited scope center" in the [area](#) of healthcare marketing.

2. **System Administration (Information item.)** - The following are new limited scope centers and institutes.
- k. **USM** - In the spring of 2009, the university will establish the Center for Healthcare Marketing and Sales, which will be a limited scope center that will advance education, research, and practice in healthcare sales and marketing by coordinating activities between students and potential employers, and by serving as a resource for healthcare and other related industries through educational programs and professional development activities. The center will serve as a resource for faculty interested in research activities related to healthcare sales and marketing. The new center will have an advisory board comprised of faculty administrators from the College of Business, and managers and executives from industry that will provide guidance and assistance related to center activities. The center will be funded with extramural grant funds, thus there will be no new costs to the institution.

Long-time readers of USMNEWS.net recall that CoB center directors (e.g., William Gunther, John Clark, etc.) are awarded 2-class teaching loads each semester as part of their compensation. As such, if Wittmann is elevated to Director of the CoB's new Center for Healthcare Marketing and Sales, sources tell USMNEWS.net that he will be adding a title that ensures a 2/2 teaching load as far as the eye can see.

Google Scholar Revisits Marketing & Fashion Merchandising

It has been a few months since we examined Google Scholar cites in the CoB's marketing unit. We revisit the marketing professors' Google Scholar citations in Table 3 below.

As Table 3 indicates, Michael Wittmann, the *Draughn Distinguished Associate Professor of Healthcare Marketing*, leads the GS cites race marketing, followed by Elizabeth LaFleur and *newly-hired assistant* professor John Hansen. Amazingly, 63.6% of the CoB's marketing faculty do not have any cited work, one of the worst statistics in the entire CoB (for this category).

It has also been a few months since we examined Google Scholar cites in the CoB's fashion merchandising unit. We revisit the fashion merchandising professors' Google Scholar citations in Table 4 below.

As Table 4 indicates, associate professor Brigitte Burgess leads the GS cites race in FM. About 67% of the CoB's FMt faculty do not have any cited work, one of the highest statistics in the CoB (for this category).

As Table 6 indicates, associate professor of BL Ernest King is closing in on 180 GS cites, and 100% of the CoB's BL faculty have cited work. This is the best in the CoB (for this category).

The purpose of doing this is not to highlight the fact that newly-appointed interim chair of MGT & MKT, David Duhon, *missed* the meeting, his first as interim chair. No, this section of **CoB News, 29 October 2008**, focuses on the comments of another CoB administrator, EFIB chairman George Carter.

1.0 Chair Yadrick called the meeting to order at 12:20.

2.0 Introductions

Dr. Yadrick welcomed new members and initiated introductions.

3.0 Membership Roster

Council members discussed the membership roster and provided information regarding terms of service. Membership status was updated for everyone except Dr. Ken Malone. COST needs to elect a new representative to replace Dr. Dixon. Dr. Nored will follow-up with Dr. Dixon.

4.0 Website

Peggy Price discussed the new website for COC. She has transferred documents and content from the old site into the standard USM template and is in the process of updating the pages. The url is www.usm.edu/coc.

5.0 Election of Chair-elect

Dr. Yadrick opened the floor for nominations for chair-elect for 2008-2009. Dr. Edward Mann was nominated and elected by acclamation.

6.0 Faculty Handbook Changes

Dr. Yadrick offered copies of the document reflecting changes to the Faculty Handbook recommended by the Handbook Committee and approved by Faculty Senate. The changes were submitted to the COC for review, not approval. Dr. Carter determined that the changes will not necessitate a change to the COB Faculty Handbook. He also suggested a clarification to section 8:3:1:

The handbook should explicitly number each of the 3 options for personnel committee membership in order to make clear the paragraph at the bottom of the page referring to Option 1, Option 2, and Option 3.

7.0 Communication with Provost: priority concerns of COC

Chair Yadrick opened discussion about the Provost meeting with the Council and a review of the priority concerns. She suggested a meeting first between the

In the CoC Minutes insert above, Carter explains to the CoC that USM's then newly-amended Faculty Handbook contained new language about the composition of faculty governance committees. That new language is actually *old* language reborn, and it concerns the **three** governance options available to USM faculty. Though some CoB faculty may have been voting on the basis of *three* options for some time, long-time readers of USMNEWS.net are aware that recent versions of the USM Faculty Handbook stipulated only *two* options: (1) three faculty members (chair eligible) and (2) chair only. Recent amendments to the Faculty Handbook signal a return to the past, when there were three options: (1) three faculty, no chair, (2) three faculty, w/ chair as one of three, and (3) chair only. The section – 8.3.1 – of the recently amended USM Faculty Handbook referred to by Carter above is inserted below:

8.3 THE DEPARTMENTAL PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

8.3.1 Committee Membership. All members of departmental Corps of Instruction with a minimum of three (3) years of service with the University and who hold the rank of associate professor or higher are eligible for committee membership. Department chairs with less than three years of service at the University, who hold the rank of Associate Professor or higher, are also eligible for committee membership. The Departmental Personnel Committee is elected annually by the members of the Corps of Instruction employed by the academic department. This election occurs at a departmental meeting and is accomplished by means of a secret ballot. A department may choose one of the following three options for its Departmental Personnel Committee: Option 1: Authority for all personnel evaluations and recommendations, exclusive of recommendations for pre-tenure review, tenure, and promotion, is vested in the department chair. Option 2: A personnel committee consisting of the department chair and two members of the Corps of Instruction employed by the academic department. The three-member committee then elects its chair. The chair of the committee, after obtaining signed concurrence or dissent from each committee member, submits the committee's evaluations and recommendations to the department chair. In turn, the department chair prepares independent personnel evaluations and recommendations and transmits them, along with the signed evaluations and recommendations of the Departmental Personnel Committee, to the dean of the college. Option 3: A personnel committee consisting of three members of the Corps of Instruction employed by the academic department, exclusive of the department chair. The three member committee then elects its chair. The chair of the committee, after obtaining signed concurrence or dissent from each committee member, submits the committee's evaluations and recommendations to the department chair. In turn, the department chair prepares independent personnel evaluations and recommendations and transmits them, along with the signed evaluations and recommendations of the Departmental Personnel Committee, to the dean of the college.

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As is clear, the USM Faculty Handbook Committee ultimately took Carter's "suggestions" to heart and "explicitly number[ed]" the three *new* (or *old*) faculty governance options. According to sources, for USM faculty governance the 2008 Faculty Handbook amendments represent a not-so-good journey back to the future.

Unfortunately, sources add, the skullduggery does not stop here. The following page of the 2008 Faculty Handbook includes provisions for replacing members of the faculty governance committee. That page is inserted below:

8.3.3 Replacement of Committee Members. If a committee member resigns, dies, or otherwise relinquishes the committee position, another eligible faculty member within the department must be elected in the same manner that the original members were chosen. If a department is operating under Option 2 (department chair and two other faculty members) and the chair of the department resigns from the Departmental Personnel Committee or is no longer able to serve on that committee, the members of the department's Corps of Instruction must reconvene and choose either Option 1 or Option 3 as their operational Departmental Personnel Committee for the remainder of the academic year and until the next annual election of the Departmental Personnel Committee option.

Of particular interest is the following statement:

"If a department is operating under Option 2 (department chair and two other faculty members) and the chair of the department resigns from the Departmental Personnel Committee or is no longer able to serve on that committee, the members of the department's Corps of Instruction must reconvene and choose either Option 1 or Option 3 as their operational Departmental Personnel Committee for the remainder of the academic year and until the next annual election of the Departmental Personnel Committee option."

Thus, what was only an *unwritten* legal opinion offered by USM counsel Lee P. Gore through EFIB chairman George Carter on "[Black Tuesday](#)" of 2006 is now codified plainly in the 2008 version of USM's Faculty Handbook. And, according to sources, as a result USM department chairs can hold Option 2 hostage, meaning that there are only two *possible* options for faculty governance at USM. Of course, any department chair seeking to hold Option 2 hostage has only one thing in mind, which results in only one *real* option – in

which case there is no *option* at all – for faculty governance underneath the verdant trees and inside the sheltering walls of Southern Miss.

It has been a few months since we examined Google Scholar cites in the CoB's economics unit. We revisit ECO's Google Scholar citations in Table 7 below.

As Table 7 indicates, all but one of the CoB's economics faculty have cited work. This statistic, 91.7%, is one of the best marks (for this category) in the CoB. There is also a big battle for the top spot in ECO between professors Edward Nissan, Akbar Marvasti and Farhang Niroomand. Only 3 cites separate the top from the bottom of this group, and professor Mark Klinedinst sits only 9 GS cites behind the bottom of the group.

It has also been a few months since we examined Google Scholar cites in the CoB's finance unit. We revisit FIN's Google Scholar citations in Table 8 below.
