Return to the old (as much as possible):

Accounting (for separate AACSB concerns) Finance, Legal Studies, Real Estate, and Insurance Marketing and Fashion Merchandising Management, MIS, and Tourism Management Economics and International Business (IB)

Something new:

Quantative Studies Department: Finance, POM, Stat (2-4 faculty members currently from Economics), and MIS Real Estate, Insurance, Legal Studies Economics (no stat) and IB Management and Tourism Management Marketing and Fashion Merchandising Accounting

Quantative without Finance:

Quantative Studies (same as above minus Finance) Finance, Legal Studies, Real Estate, and Insurance Economics and IB Management and Tourism Management Marketing and Fashion Merchandising Accounting

More "Studies" but fewer Departments:

Quantative Studies (same as above) Financial Studies:

Finance, Real Estate, Insurance, Legal Studies, Economics, and IB Accounting (can be a part of Financial Studies if no separate AACSB accreditation is desired) Marketing, Management, Tourism Management, Fashion Merchandising

Marketing, Management, Tourism Management, Fasmon Merchandi

Fewer and More Traditional CoB Departments:

Accounting Finance, Insurance, Real Estate, and Legal Studies Management, Marketing, Tourism Management, Fashion Merchandising Economics and IB

Economics has so few majors that it has been paired with IB and/or other departments for years to cover for it. For the same cover reasons, Economics faculty usually teach stat courses; it is also the reason why George Carter fought so hard to stop each department

teaching its own stat course. Another possibility is to keep a few faculty to teach principles courses and send the economics major to Arts and Letters. IB, and its one faculty member, could be folded into the Management group. The same fate has been suggested for several years for MIS, but they recently hired to upgrade the department. The CoB does not need to get rid of either area, but both areas need to be more productive, more collegial, and more CoB-oriented as the CoB moves forward under Dean Nail.
