## **CoB** Committees

In a strange move that is apparently the new norm for the CoB, no committees and no committee members have been announced for the 2009-2010 year. Three committees are known to exist: the Undergraduate Programs and Assessment Committee (UPAC), the Graduate Programs and Assessment Committee (GPAC), and the College Advisory Committee (CAC). Each of these three have met and accomplished things, but the composition of the committees remains unknown to all but those people on each committee. Isn't that strange? The UPAC and GPAC had to be assembled because there were changes to be made (based on solicited faculty votes). The CAC (tenure and promotion) is required to exist for the college and the university. It also means some CoB faculty members are burdened with college service while many others are unfettered by service opportunities.
