"I have reviewed carefully the relevant sections on the Faculty Handbook and find no evidence that the department's decision violates any provision of the Faculty Handbook. Thus, I find no reason to over-rule the will of a majority of the faculty in the department." [Excerpt from an e-mail that sent on 21 September 2006 from CoB Dean Harold Doty to USM Provost Jay Grimes about George Carter's "Black Tuesday" subversion of faculty governance in the EFIB (via a "re-vote").]

"I have now reviewed the document I received from you dated October 3, 2006 in which you attempt to initiate a faculty grievance. Based on the information in the document you submitted I am forced to conclude that your initial effort does not meet the minimal sufficiency requirements for initiating a faculty grievance. . . In summary, you have failed to present any objective evidence that provisions of the Faculty Handbook were violated. As a consequence of your failure I am forced to conclude that at this time no faculty grievance has been initiated." [Excerpt of CoB Dean Harold Doty's response, via a 5 October 2006 memo, to Drs. DePree and Lindley's faculty grievance regarding the illegitimacy of George Carter's "Black Tuesday" *coup*.]
