## Doty Did What???

Soon after Harold Doty's arrival at USM, he began to dismantle the last vestiges of academic rigor in the USM CoB. These actions are largely outlined in the open letter recently posted at usmpride.com. As a recap, we want to revisit Doty's first official act to this end - he pushed the CoB faculty to remove the so called Junior Screen, the GPA requirement for admission to the upper division of the CoB. Fast forward another year to August 2006. Rumors were flying that USM's enrollment and the CoB's enrollment were down. Many sections remained open prior to the final Preview of the summer. In an act that was completely out of character, Doty showed up at the final two Previews of the summer and BEGAN A GENERAL PRACTICE OF <u>WAIVING THE JUNIOR STANDING</u> <u>REQUIREMENT</u> FOR ENROLLMENT IN 300 AND 400 LEVEL COURSES AND WAIVED COURSE PREREQUISITES, ALL <u>IN AN ATTEMPT TO INCREASE</u> <u>THE COB'S ENROLLMENT</u>.
