Centennial Week in the CoB

Of course, there was a lot of pomp and circumstance, and USM president Martha Saunders pranced around campus as much as expected (if not more). Though the week had to do with **USM** more administrators, private donors, and other constituencies, some of it did meet the CoB. This week's column reports on some of these examples.

To begin with, CoB officials named "Lulu" Lucv Buffett the 2010 Boardman Entrepreneur of the Year. Buffett, the sister of famed Jimmy Buffett, is a native of Mobile who owns and operates Lulu's Sunset Grill in Mobile. According the Van Arnold's 1-Apr-10 presser, Lulu's Grill Sunset serves 750,000 customers each year. At the Centennial Convocation, a number of CoB faculty recognized in one way or another. Associate professor of management Kenneth Zantow was recognized for 10 years of service to USM. Zantow's colleague, marketing instructor Dolly Loyd, was recognized for her own 30 years of service. Carolyn Cawthon of CoB fame was also recognized for lengthy service to the institution. Isn't it difficult to imagine that Zantow has been with the CoB for so long?





Sticking with Zantow for a bit, Zantow led a CoB team to victory in the first ever Southern Miss Gulf Coast Quiz Bowl. Former interim CoB dean Alvin Williams, now a marketing professor at the University of South Alabama, was back on the Hattiesburg campus participate in Centennial activities. Williams stood up with USM president Martha Saunders and private supporters to dedicate the new \$218,000 Centennial Gateway at the main entrance into USM. Though only at the helm for a short time, Williams was integral in getting the CoB out of the AACSB probationary 6th Year Review that the organization was led into in 2007 by former CoB dean Harold Doty.

Finally, Mississippi Governor Haley Barbour took time off to participate in USM's 100th birthday party on 30-Mar-10. In his speech, he used the phrase "exceptional curious excellence" to describe all that is going on at USM at this time. Despite of that. all Barbour continued to refer to Mississippi's public universities as economic development gold mines, a phrase he coined during the infamous Shelby Thames administration (2002-07) of USM. Not only that, Barbour took much of his time during the Centennial Convacation to praise Thames personally, and USM's polymer science efforts in particular. for putting USM on the map. His speech had some asking just how much has changed since that disastrous past USM administration. Barbour's speech suggested that not much has changed for the university.
