Here, There, & Everywhere

Examining the USM Departure of William Gunther

As the CoB's economists depart the Joseph Greene Hall stage at the end of the 2009-10 academic year, USMNEWS.net will be examining the research credentials that will be leaving the CoB, if not the institution as a whole. This installment focuses on professor William Gunther, who is one of the five mostly senior economists who retired so that the four mostly junior CoB economists could maintain their USM careers in the USM College of Arts & Letters.

What will the USM lose with Gunther's departure? On the research front, Table 1 below (which contains Gunther's publications trail based on information located in the USMNEWS.net Archives and/or found using Google) suggests not much.

As is the case with other USM economists examined via this series (e.g., Sami Dakhlia), Gunther's publications trail above is like academic cotton candy. There are several small gaps in output from 1969 through 1987, followed by a larger gap from 1988-92. Gunther came to USM in 1998, and has remained since that year. He has not published anything (that researchers could locate) over the 1997-2010 period. It is not difficult to see why the CoB was forced to count Gunther as "not Academically Qualified" during the most recent (2007) AACSB Peer Review Team visit.

Gunther came to USM's CBA in 1998 as its new dean. From the beginning, Gunther's service was mired in a controversy involving Gunther teaching at the University of Alabama (and possibly another institution) while dean of the b-school at USM.
