## Louisiana College Paid Ex-Official \$33,000 to Stay Silent on Accusations

Louisiana College paid a former official more than \$33,000 as part of a severance agreement after he threatened to go public with accusations against the Southern Baptist-affiliated college's president, <u>reports</u> *The Town Talk*, in Alexandria, La.

Joseph Cole, a former special assistant to the college's president, Joe Aguillard, said another college official had directed him to forge administrators' signatures on documents. He also accused Mr. Aguillard of falsely creating minutes of a meeting for a report to the college's accreditor, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges.

The newspaper obtained documents stating that Mr. Cole had received \$25,000 in severance pay and an additional \$8,348.54 in unpaid overtime as part of a settlement in which he agreed to keep his knowledge of the college's activities confidential.

The documents came to light days after the college said its accreditor had <u>"fully exonerated"</u> Mr. Aguillard of allegations of wrongdoing.

Mr. Aguillard and the chairman of the college's Board of Trustees released a statement to the newspaper saying that the information concerned "a matter from the past that has been addressed years ago." They said the college was moving forward "to continue to fulfill the mission God has called us to carry out."
