Palmer by Land, Saunders by Air II

In speaking about the national exposure that USM is currently receiving for winning the Gainesville Regional and advancing to the College World Series, USM president Martha Saunders told The Hattiesburg American that "[p]eople are writing about this Cinderella team, and connecting it to the school. Four years ago, we were flat on our backs after Katrina. We recovered from that and we received a \$6 million gift from heaven. We just think the universe is smiling on us." In her comment, Saunders appears to have forgotten that most of USM's scholarship and professorship endowments are underwater, and that the University and State are facing dire budgetary situations (and for the second year in a row). Not only that, some readers are offended at Saunders' statement about the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina.
