Interestingly, reports in the USMNEWS.net Archives indicate that Sayre once faced two job offers from USM – one from von Herrmann's international development department, and the other from George Carter's EFIB. Obviously, he chose the former, which sources say was yet another bring in the failure wall built by Carter. Lastly, schedule updates from the USM registrar also reveal that Daniel Monchuk's section of ECO 450 has been cancelled, reducing Monchuk's fall 2010 load from 4 courses and 3 preps to 3 courses and 2 preps.
