Back to Tehran in 2005 An Investigative Series on Travel by CoB Faculty

Investigators at usmpride.com have recently learned that CoB Associate Dean Farhang Niroomand made a trip to his home country of Iran in 2005. Much like his earlier trips home, this one was also at the "invitation" of the Central Bank of Iran, and this one also cost USM and Mississippi taxpayers a few thousand dollars.

The insert above, taken from Niroomand's **Permission to Travel** form, states that he was to participate in "The 15th Conference on Monetary and Foreign Exchange Policies" which was to occur at the Central Bank of Iran from May 14-19, 2005. The insert below indicates exactly what Niroomand's plans were at the time:

Next, we turn to the meals and lodging portion of Niroomand's trip home:

As the insert above points out, the total costs of meals and lodging over the 11 May 2005 through 18 May 2005 period was \$1,240.00. What about use of his personal vehicle? That expense totaled \$14.58 (see below).

Notice above that Niroomand did not arrive back at Pine Belt Airport until 28 May 2005, even though the Central Bank affair concluded almost 10 days before.

Of course, a trip to Iran will involve **Travel by Public Carrier**, which this one did. Those expenses are detailed below:

Public carrier expenses came to a total of \$2,085.49, and included a round trip involving Tehran, Iran, and Shiraz, Iran (\$191.40).

So, Niroomand's trip to Iran in May of 2005 came to a total of \$3,615.07, or roughly the entire yearly travel budgets of 4-6 CoB faculty members.

In the screen above, Niroomand notes that the "15th Conf . . ." runs from May 14-19, 2005. However, correspondence from officials in Iran tells a different story:



Note that the document above describes a *two-day Conference*, and one that runs from *May 16-17, 2005*, and not a *six-day Conference* that runs from *May 14-19, 2005*, as Niroomand reports on his **Permission to Travel** form.

Not only may Niroomand have stretched a 2-day event into a 6-day one, he also extended a 4-7 day trip into a 2 and ½ -week junket, consuming a little more than one-half of the month of May, 2005, as the small insert below indicates:

Update

The following screen indicates that Niroomand's reimbursement for this trip to Iran was \$2,300.00, and not for the full amount of expenses, which was \$3,615.07.



Niroomand did receive an advance of \$1,840, and additional paperwork suggests that he received reimbursement of \$460 in addition to that.
