#### **USM Student Slams Giannini**

Graduate student Justin Dunfee is the latest in a parade of USM students to publicly criticize the USM administration. The counseling psychology student from Texas penned a letter to *The Student Printz* on 22-Nov-2010, blasting USM athletics director Richard Giannini over the decision to provide a \$35,000 raise to USM head football coach Larry Fedora. Calling Giannini a "blatant hypocrite," Dunfee suggests that Giannini ". . . should start kissing more private donors' asses to help offset the athletic fees students pay" as part of their tuition each year. As reported by many sources in recent weeks, USM students fund, through a so-called tuition tax, about \$6 million of the USM athletics department's approximately \$19 million budget each year. Also, about \$1 million of the remaining \$13 million comes from a transfer to athletics from the institution's academic affairs (E&G) fund. The latter sum comes straight from Mississippi taxpayers.

### "Teaching Out" of ECO Getting More Bizarre

All one has to do is read USMNEWS.net's ... breaking news ... story about USM's plan for "teaching out" the now-defunct B.S. in economics to understand that the institution is at a crossroads when it comes to maintaining academic integrity in the face of massive budget cuts totaling \$25 million over FY11 and FY12. Now, new evidence is emerging regarding the "teaching out" of ECO that makes USM student Zach Mansell's account look positive by comparison.

As the table above indicates, the "teaching out" portion of ECO's spring 2011 class schedule guide (i.e., the last two rows) includes courses taught by Edward Nissan and Mark Klinedinst, two of the five CoB economists who were forced into retirement by the FY11 budget cut plan carried out by the Martha Saunders administration. The "enrolled" numbers suggest that "teaching out" is quietly becoming "taught out," as only six and four students are enrolled in ECO 340 and ECO 345, respectively. Sources tell USMNEWS.net that the assignment of Nissan,

a statistician, to teach ECO 340 is more than disconcerting. There is no record of Nissan having taught an "ECO" course, and reports coming into USMNEWS.net indicate that ECO 340 was one of three integral courses in the now-defunct economics program.

The table above also shows that Klinedinst is teaching a full course load in spring 2011, as is Trellis Green, a third member of the group of five who was forced into retirement by the FY11 budget cuts totaling \$10 million. The other full load is being taught by Kaustav Misra, the Mississippi State University PhD student called upon by political science chair Allan McBride earlier this semester to relieve him (McBride) of ECO teaching duties.

#### USM Students Rewriting Hattiesburg Nightlife

According to Terry Jones' 23-Nov-2010 story for *The Hattiesburg American* entitled "Bar hours now under scrutiny," Hattiesburg Mayor Johnny DuPree has put together a committee, *including USM students*, to ". . . hash out the issues involved in the wake of the [shooting] incident" involving three USM football players. DuPree told Jones that the committee is hoping to put together a proposal regarding new nightlife rules for Hattiesburg in time for him to address the City Council in the early part of 2011. Though the committee's work is just underway, DuPree informed Jones that he thinks that there is already a consensus among the group to close all nightclubs at midnight, rather than the 2 a.m. closing time they currently operate under.
















## **Wounded USM Football Players Released from Hospital**

Just days ago USM head football coach Larry Fedora informed the media that the three USM football players who were wounded in a recent shooting incident outside of Remington's Hunt Club in Hattiesburg were released from Forrest General Hospital. According to Fedora, the players are doing much better, and he expects two of them – Deddrick Jones and Tim Green – to play football again in the future. The other, Martez Smith, is reportedly paralyzed from the waist down as a result of the shooting.

Meanwhile, the emotional boost that the USM football team rode from the shooting incident to defeat Houston on 20-Nov-2010 apparently fizzled out on 26-Nov-2010, as USM fell to Tulsa by a score of 50-56. This loss brings Fedora's overall record at USM to 22-16, and marks the third time this season that USM has scored more than 40 points only to lose. The other two came against East Carolina and UAB, with both games being played in Hattiesburg.
