79% to 83% for Daniel

With 351 total votes counted, 79% (279) of USM students <u>support</u> Daniel Miles' <u>plan</u> to (1) shift $\frac{1}{2}$ of the USM tuition tax for athletics into academic affairs, and (2) have USM students pay for tickets to athletics events rather than have them provided at no charge by the university. Only 16% (57) of students are opposed, with 4% (15) indicating that they *might be* in favor. Miles is but one of the students who has <u>stepped up</u> in recent weeks to challenge the Martha Saunders administration's handling of budgetary affairs.

Eagles Tumble in Latest SSC+USM Football Poll



Ebke's USM Soccer Program Sinks to New Low

Scott Ebke's USM <u>soccer team</u> finished its 2010 season on 29-Oct-2010, losing 0-6 to Central Florida. With the drubbing, the Lady Eagles finished the year 3-14-2 (wins-losses-ties), its worst record under Ebke since he took the reins in 2007.



The figure above is adapted from that appearing in <u>Aunt Martha's Seasons</u>. When Ebke's dismal 21.1% winning clip from 2010 is added to those from 2007-09, one can see that (1) his yearly records have worsened steadily since 2007, (2) his 2010 season has been the worst on record, and (3) his best record, which came in 2007, was *well below 50%* on the winning front. With the Saunders administration slashing academic programs and tenured/tenure-track faculty, many USM followers are likely now wondering how so many athletics program and coaches seem to be immune from similar treatment.
