The Days of Mincing Words are Long Gone.

<u>Jeff Greenfield</u> doesn't mince words:

The very awfulness of this case [Sandusky/Penn State University] conceals a broader but less dramatic issue: at root, big-time college sports is a sham that exists in substantial measure to enrich a handful of schools, coaches and athletic conferences while happily <u>exploiting</u> the talents and <u>bodies</u> of young men—a disproportionate number of them African-American.

All the while, as if nothing awful is going on in college football, schools like University of Southern Mississippi, <u>"led" by administrators and sports-crazy-alums</u>, are <u>driven</u> to emulate big-money sports schools like Penn State. <u>Coaches</u> are paid more than some whole college departments based, in no small part, on <u>"tuition taxes</u>" charged to students regardless of their interest or lack there of in attending sports activities. Young men are recruited to play sports with no real expectation their <u>"scholarships</u>" will lead to <u>any</u> <u>degree</u>, let alone a marketable degree. <u>Violations of standards</u> become routine, dismissed as minor. At Southern Miss, administrators could not get away <u>with their behavior</u>, if they were not supported by their bosses at the Institutions of Higher Learning, faculty, and <u>the alums</u> who <u>pour money</u> over the whole intercollegiate big-money football/basketball enterprise.

There's a simple way to solve big-money sports corruption on university campuses:

Get big-money sports off our campuses!
