Nepotism at Italian and American Universities

A few days ago, usmnews.net received an email from Concerned Citizen addressing nepotism at the University of Texas – Tyler. A few days later, a research project entitled, "<u>Measuring nepotism through shared last names: the case of Italian academia</u>" was announced. Before you read the email from Concerned Citizen, it is instructive to consider an excerpt from the Italian experience.

Italian Nepotism

"In recent years, several scandals have hit Italian academia over the hiring of close family members to prominent faculty positions at public universities...Unusually high clustering of last names within Italian academic institutions and disciplines indicates widespread nepotism in the country's schools, according to a new computational analysis.

By comparing the frequency of last names among more than 61,000 professors in medicine, engineering, law, and other fields, University of Chicago researcher Stefano Allesina found the pattern to be incompatible with unbiased, equal opportunity hiring. The analysis, published online in the journal *PLoS ONE*, refutes the notion that recently publicized cases of academic nepotism in Italy were isolated incidents."

If you think nepotism doesn't occur in American universities, you may want to review what's going on at your school. At far too many universities, bureaucrats, primarily upper level administrators, are on the same track as our Italian colleagues when it comes to hiring family.
