IHL Spin In Perspective

Bill Crawford's opinion piece in <u>July 10, 2012 *Hattiesburg American*</u> asks readers to understand that "Tuition fuels university spending."

Mr. Crawford cut through IHL statistical tomfoolery by observing that, although "the percentage of the IHL budget covered by state appropriations" has declined since 2000, the state appropriations in terms of dollars during that period has increased from \$636.7 million to \$669.8 million. An important observation, Mr. Crawford. It provides perspective on the IHL statistical spin.

The IHL claims that the decline in the IHL budget covered by state appropriations warrants increases in tuition, year after year after year. Mr. Crawford is offering that cost control at the states public universities is an alternative to increasing tuition.
